Dr. Gray Heppner Reveals the Apolitical Truth About the Last Pandemic and the Daunting Challenges of the Next

A nationally recognized expert in infectious diseases and a U.S. Army Veteran himself, Dr. Gray Heppner addressed attendees at the March luncheon. Forty-seven members and guests gathered in the Club at Glenmoore dining room to hear him provide an unvarnished appraisal of the nation's management of the COVID-19 Pandemic and his conclusions on how the next one might be handled differently.

He shared his science-based opinions without reservation, reflecting the seriousness of the topic. He believes that the COVID-19 virus was most likely due to an unintentional laboratory leak in Wuhan China and that their the reluctance to share the necessary genetic data to support the global development of countermeasures, as well as the WHO-delayed declaration of a Public Health Emergency of International Concern, exacerbated the tragic outcome. He also criticized the U.S. performance, citing lack of preparedness, politicization of the public health response, press malfeasance, poor communications and the inadequate National Strategic Stockpile of medical materiel. He finished with an overview of the work by the Bipartisan Commission of Biodefense and their recommendations for policy and technical preparations - starting now for the next pandemic which will certainly come. National MOAA Corner: TRICARE Improves Coverage of Early Alzheimer's Treatment By: Karen Ruedisueli March 25, 2025



TRICARE addressed a critical coverage gap by approving provisional coverage of a new type of drug for the treatment of early stage Alzheimer's disease – a move <u>supported by MOAA</u> and fellow key military and veterans groups. For up to the next five years, TRICARE will cover Food and Drug Administration (FDA)-approved monoclonal antibodies (MABs) lecanemab (brand name Leqembi) and donanemab (brand name Kisunla), for the treatment of Alzheimer's disease in patients with mild cognitive impairment or in the mild dementia stage of the disease. The Assistant Secretary of Defense for Health Affairs approved the change last October. MOAA has worked to fix this coverage gap since the 118th Congress alongside stakeholders like The Military Coalition (TMC) – a group of military and veterans service organizations representing nearly 5.5 million members combined.


Reimbursement Options


MOAA has confirmed reimbursements for Leqembi and Kisunla are in effect. Beneficiaries whose claims were paid by Medicare but denied by TRICARE should contact the WPS customer service team for assistance in ensuring those claims are now processed under TRICARE For Life. There is no need to submit a corrected claim – simply reach out with details on the affected claims for reconsideration. You can contact the WPS customer service team through the <u>TRICARE4u.com</u> portal or by calling (866) 773-0404. Coverage is retroactive to Oct. 23, 2024, the provisional decision approval date.

Filling the Gap

Several impacted MOAA members initially alerted MOAA to this coverage gap; we appreciate their outreach, along with the support of members who reached out to their lawmakers on this issue via our *Legislative Action Center*. Before the provisional coverage decision, TRICARE's outdated policy excluded coverage of MABs, including Leqembi, even though the drug has had full FDA approval since July 6, 2023. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) approved Medicare coverage for Leqembi, and federal employees have had access to Leqembi under the BlueCross BlueShield Federal Employee Program, a key benchmark plan for evaluating TRICARE coverage.

Treatment for Alzheimer's disease is most effective when administered early – delays can result in irreversible disease progression – which made this prolonged TRICARE coverage gap particularly egregious. MOAA will continue its work to ensure TRICARE coverage keeps pace with plans offered in the federal and civilian sectors, protecting the value of your earned benefit and preserving your access to world-class care.

Greetings fellow members.

With the 2025 General Assembly behind us, this is the season to begin laying the groundwork for the next year's legislative season—but also to look at what is happening at the federal level and MOAA's nation-wide advocacy efforts.

The Joint Leadership Council (JLC) meets later this month in Richmond to discuss and prepare for drafting legislative initiatives for 2026. One objective is simply to get the process started earlier this cycle to better align our advocacy efforts alongside the host of other lobbying efforts that start vying for member's support well before the fall season.

This is a busy political year in the commonwealth with every seat in the House of Delegates up for reelection in November. Virginia is also electing a new governor, and the contest between the leading candidates, former Democratic US Representative Abigail Spanberger and Republican Lieutenant Governor Winsome Sears, is sure to draw national attention. Notably, both gubernatorial candidates have national security and military credentials—Spanberger, a former CIA officer, and Sears, a Marine veteran.

On the federal level, MOAA's priorities center around the annual Advocacy in Action campaign and you can help support that effort (see www.moaa.org/advocacy-news for more detailed information). Hundreds of MOAA members are gathering in Washington DC on 9 April to meet with congressional members, but the campaign continues throughout the year. This year, MOAA has identified 5 key legislative areas: 1. Improving access to veteran health care, 2. Supporting family veteran caregivers, 3. Expediting care for veterans exposed to service-related toxins, 4. Improving

military housing, and 5. Promoting military spouse employment.
